Petrol Leak Sparks Health Fears

Exxon Mobil is facing legal action after petrol leaked underground and contaminated the water supply in part of suburban Melbourne. The EPA has launched an investigation "with a view to taking enforcement action". Maximum penalties include \$250,000 fines and jail terms. The leak was in an old pipe system between petrochemical plants in Altona and Yarraville storage facilities.

Gas Leak Contained

A major gas leak occurred during refilling underground storage tanks at Unigas Service Station, Pacific Highway, Artarmon. The operators immediately shut off the refilling hoses and contacted emergency services. Gas company experts assessed the leak and determined that a faulty gauge on the underground tank had become over-pressurised, causing the main valve to leak. Road closures remained in place for several hours while two tanker trucks were brought in to decant the underground tanks to relieve the pressure. There were no injuries during the incident and the Pacific Highway remained open.

The EPA conducted the audit after a 15,000 litre diesel spill. The audit found that most sites along the River did not have an environmental management system.
